Welcome to Hootin an Hollarin

HOWDY, FOLKS

Hello, everyone! We're gearing up for the 63rd Hootin an Hollarin festival, and we're hoping that you'll be here for all of the fun! I'd like to point out some new elements you might notice at the festival this year:

More old-time demonstrations

This year's festival theme is "A Harvest of Memories Past," and that's just what we hope to showcase during our beloved three-day event.

We're adding six new demonstrators this year: Sarah Elrod with the Missouri Department of Conservation will be offering a free handson leather working station (Friday only); Jason Morton of Eagle Ridge Chainsaw Carving will demonstrate the art of carving wood with a chainsaw; Cynthia Stevens will demonstrate spinning, weaving and making hooked items; Kylie Smith will demonstrate crocheting; Andy and Kara Collins Leach of West Plains with Get to the Points Knapping will demonstrate flintknapping; and we're bringing back our free ragdoll making booth, which will be manned by Abby Durr Friday and Saturday.

Returning demonstrators will offer homemade bread and apple butter (free samples available!); a demonstration of the art of crafting handmade corn brooms; an authentic moonshine still; traditional lye soap making; an old-fashioned way of making rope and shingles; a mountain man in traditional attire with an authentic teepee showcasing flint-lock rifle building and possibly primitive firemaking and cooking; and a demonstration on fly tying.

Main stage dedication and entertainment

This year we will be dedicating and naming the Hootin an Hollarin main stage in honor of the late Dr. Bob Main, who died Aug. 15, after a short illness. Bob took on the complicated process of setting up the main stage and helping to build the dance platforms for many years. He always had a good attitude and humorous spirit. We'll be thinking of him this year and for many years to come as we prepare for the festival.

We have several new bands this year. Layton Hollow Gals, Homestead Holler, Molly Clair & Co., Marriott Brothers, Scarlet O'Hara and Chelsey James will be new featured acts on the Hootin an Hollarin main stage.

Returning favorites include Backyard Bluegrass, Baker Family, Stringed Union, Ridgerunner Cloggers and Psychobilly Cadillac, which had the crowd on their feet and dancing all night during last year's festival.

We'll also welcome a few local young musicians to kick off the festival Thursday night - Jessica Suit, Ainsley Luna, Finn Wade, Wyatt Dodge and Colton Wood.

Queen pageant gifts

New this year, all Hootin an Hollarin queen pageant contestants will get a free mini photo shoot from Karla Smith Photography during one of their dress rehearsals.

The winning contestant who is crowned Hootin an Hollarin queen will also get a full photo shoot from Karla and a \$500 scholarship from Arkansas State University -Mountain Home, in addition to the traditional prizes and

gifts offered in previous years.

New car show

We're also excited about a new event at the festival - a car show! Mike and Heather Gardner are heading the show up from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, ending just in time for the participants to join the 2 p.m. parade around the square.

Food and drinks

There are three new food vendors: Tin Lizzie's Tonic Truck; Theodosia Area Volunteer Fire Department serving hand-dipped ice cream; and the South Fork Lunch Box.

More than 20 other food and drink vendors are returning to the festival. See page 9 for a full list.

Kiddie train

The Lutie FFA and cheerleaders will be offering a kiddie train this year, which has been missing from the festival for the last few years. The train will cost \$1 to ride and will operate around the square from 10 a.m. until dark both Friday and Saturday.



Hootin an Hollarin attendees can expect a number of good choices for food, crafts, games, demonstrations and more at this year's event. Among the vendors signed up is Abby (Britt) Hobbs at her booth Honey Layne, where she will offer bracelets, prints, journals and car charms.

VENDORS & BOOTHS

Hootin an Hollarin's old-time craft and food vendors circle the square during the threeday festival, creating great shopping, watching, visiting and eating anywhere you look.

• 3-in-1 obstacle course (#88-89): An inflatable 3-in-1 obstacle course will feature a bounce area, climbing surface and wide slide. **All-day wrist bands and one-time entrance fees will be available for purchase at the GHS Scream Team booth.

 Bounce house (#64B): Lutie School FFA and cheerleaders will operate a bounce house Friday and Saturday afternoons into the evening. It is \$1 per bounce.

• Bean bag toss (#70): The Lutie junior class will have a bean bag toss game.

• Dart game (#66): the Gainesville High School seniors will offer a dart booth.

• Duck pond game (#65): the Gainesville High School juniors will have a duck pond game. • Face painting (#94): Tonya Friend will offer facepainting.

• Face painting (#28): Renea Vaughn will offer facepaint at her booth.

• Face painting (#64B): Lutie FFA and cheerleaders will offer facepainting.

• Free leather working station (free, #95): Sarah Elrod of the Missouri Department of Conservation is hosting a free leather working station on Friday.

• Hair braiding with beads, hair color spray (#60): The Kingdom Daughters will have hair braiding with beads and a colored hair spray station at their booth.

• Nerf guns with ping pong balls and ring toss with suckers (#67) - The Gainesville High School music department will have a game with nerf guns and ping pong balls, as well as a ring toss with suckers.

 Putt putt golf (#69): the Lutie High School freshmen will offer a hole-in-one putt putt golf game.

 Ragdoll making station (free, #96): Abby Durr will be hosting this year's free ragdoll making booth. Come learn how to make these old-time toys -- and leave with a completed ragdoll (or take a kit to make one at home). All supplies provided free of charge.

Ringtoss (#69): the Lutie School music

class will offer a ringtoss game.

• Rock climbing wall (#92-93): a rock climbing wall will be set up in the Century Bank of the Ozarks parking lot. **Climbing will be offered for \$5 per turn at the GHS Scream Team booth.

• Ropemaking and shingle making (#84): Festival goers can take their turn trying out the art of making rope in Lynn and Charlotte Taylor's booth. The Taylors will also demonstrate the art of making traditional shingles.

Kids train (#64): Lutie School FFA and cheerleders are operating a kids' train at this year's festival from 10 a.m. to dark Friday and Saturday. It will cost \$1 to ride the train.
Wacky basketball (#92-93): a "wacky basketball" inflatable game will be set up in the Century Bank of the Ozarks parking lot. **All-day wrist bands and one-time entrance fees will be available for purchase at the GHS Scream Team booth.

• Additional free games and activities: In addition to these attractions, there are several free fun opportunities for kids at the festival. See pages 30-31 for information on the Shelter Insurance Kids Corner, old-fashioned kids games, terrapin races and more - all free of charge!

This year the Hootin an Hollarin committee is paying the GHS cheerleaders to run a booth for an inflatable 3-in-1 obstacle course, wacky basketball game and rock climbing wall in order to raise money for team expenses. The rock climbing wall will cost \$5 per climb. The obstacle course and basketball game will be \$2 per turn, or guests can buy an all-day wrist band on Friday or Saturday for unlimited play on both the slide and bounce house for \$10 per child. A safety worker with the rental company will be at the rock climbing wall to ensure safe practices by climbers.






Gazebo pickin' Friday and Saturday afternoons

To find the heart of the Hootin an Hollarin spirit, look no further than the swirling, twirling groups of folks out on the old wooden platforms dancing the night away under the starry September sky. Every night from 9 p.m. to midnight, Hootin an Hollarin turns its focus to one of its most fun and festive features – square dancing.

Want to join the fun? Here's how Hootin an Hollarin square-dance regulars recommend you get your start. Usually there's a big group of youngish square dancers on the south platform, the one farthest from the stage. It's generally accepted that everyone is welcome on that dance floor, and those young whippersnappers are good at teaching novices of all ages the basics of how to step, twirl and allemande through the caller's commands.

When you're ready to try to participate with the more experienced dancers on one of the platforms closer to the stage, wait 'til they're taking a break between songs and then ask one of the dancers if you might join their square for a song or two. You'll soon be do-si-doing with the best of 'em (literally!), and having a great time doing it. It's what Hootin an Hollarin is all about.



Like these beauties from Ozark County's days gone by, local young women still dress up in their finery for Hootin an Hollarin's annual queen pageant, sharing their stories, songs and other talents in a country-style pageant to kick off the festival.

When you visit Hootin an Hollarin, be sure to stop by the Ozark County Historium to see a display of scrapbooks that tell the celebration's story as it has evolved through the years, including many photos of the queen pageants. The Historium, home of the Ozark County Genealogical and Historium Society, holds a wealth of information about our county and the general area. Dozens of historic photos are on display, and there's a bevy of beautiful quilts for your viewing pleasure. The Historium also just happens to be a welcoming, easily accessible place to sit a spell and cool off.

The Historium will be open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day of Hootin an Hollarin. We are also open regularly from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Wednesday through Friday, except for holiday and weather closures. We'll make you welcome anytime you come!





SHOTGUN & BOW SHOOT

9 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 21 • In grassy area across Highway 160 from square

Hootin an Hollarin sportsmen and sportswomen can show off their shooting skills at the annual Hootin an Hollarin shotgun and archery shoot, which begins at 9 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 21.

The event, sometimes referred to as the "turkey shoot," is always well attended by spectators as well as participants. It's held across Highway 160 from the Gainesville square in the grassy area near the Barney Douglas Bridge.

Missouri Department of Conservation agent Tom Leeker will oversee this year's shoot with help from MDC's Mark

Henry.

The event features shooting competitions in 12- or 20-gauge shotgun and bow categories.

In the shotgun competition, shooters test their skill by taking aim at paper targets. For the archery portion, competitors shoot 3D targets (generally three different animals and one block target).

Multiple matches in each category will be held to involve all participants who want to compete. Competitors can choose to compete in one or both categories.

It costs \$3 each to enter each

round of competition (per shot for shotgun and per four targets on archery), and there is a 100 percent payout in Town & Country Supermarket gift certificates for the winners.

Those wishing to participate should register just before 9 a.m. at the competition site.

Participants in the archery category should bring their own bow and at least four arrows. Participants in the shotgun competition should bring their own firearm; shotgun ammunition will be provided.



Bands, floats & fun

Saturday Big Parade

2 p.m. Saturday • Floats judged at 12:30 in lot off First Street (see below)

Hundreds of spectators line the streets of Gainesville on Saturday, Sept. 21, afternoon of Hootin an Hollarin as the Big Parade steps off at 2 p.m..

This year's lineup promises to be another crowd pleaser, with five marching bands expected, imaginative floats, antique cars and other vehicles, horses and all sorts of other entries.

Parade co-chairs Kerrie Zubrod and Heather Bushner say more floats are needed for this year's parade. Keeping in mind this year's festival theme - "A Harvest of Memories Past," - area organizations, families and individuals are encouraged to round up friends and neighbors, tap into their inner creativity and build a float on a pickup bed or a flat-top trailer (or whatever) to join the parade. There's a good chance your float will win something: the \$150 grand prize, \$100 first place, \$75 second place, \$50 third place or \$25 fourth place.

The prizes, not to mention the fun of waving to all those smiling faces, makes Hootin an Hollarin floats worth the effort.

Floats must be available for judging at 12:30 p.m. Saturday at the parking lot off First Street between 160 Pit Stop and White Oak Station/Phillips 66 (formerly J-Mart/Bullseye) behind the tiny log cabin in that parking lot (This year's Hootin an Hollarin inagural car show will also be housed in this parking lot). 



This year's farm family of the year is the King family of Dora

The King family resides in Dora where they run a cow/calf operation, Eric King Auction Service, volunteer with the Back to School Basics of Ozark County and buy and sell farm equipment.

Eric has been a salesman for Glazers in Mountain Home for several years, and Jaime has been a teacher at Dora R-III School District for many years.

Eric and Jaime include their two young boys in the day-to -day operations on the family farm, and the boys love helping with the cattle and using equipment. Jedsen is a fourth grader at Dora who plays basketball and baseball when he isn't home trying to drive whatever his parents will let him. Jesse is three. The Missouri Farm Bureau, along with the Missouri Department of Agriculture, the Missouri State Fair and State Fair Commissioners, MU Extension and Engagement and the University of Missouri College of Agriculture Food and Natural Resources, partner annually to put on this traditional event. The families honored represent all the varied farming operations that make up our state, everything from row crops and cattle, pork and chicken operations to organic farms, nut and fruit orchard operations, agritourism and even intercity urban gardening operations — the Farm Families represent a slice of rural life in our state. For a number of years MU Extension and Farm Bureau have worked together to handle the details of the event. Members of MU Extension County Councils from all 114 counties, along with their counterparts in all the Farm Bureau Offices in each county, nominate and vote on that year's honor family. The event itself falls on the first Monday of the fair. On that day, approximately 500 family members that comprise those honor families from each county come together to be honored at a BBQ awards dinner and day at the fair.

JR HISTORIC FESTIVAL

week after A Gainesville's first Hootin an Hollarin in 1961, the Ozark County Times reported, "Ozark County festival draws largest crowds in years; may become annual event."

That was Nov. 2, 1961, and Hootin an Hollarin has been drawing large crowds to the Gainesville square every fall since then, with the exception of 2020, when the festival was canceled due to the

covid-19 pandemic.

The festival came about when local Extension agent Fred Oehring and the county agent for community affairs, Doyle Sanders, organized a meeting to bring together three distinctive factions of Ozark Countians country folks, townspeople and resort owners - around a common "community interest."

Two hundred people attended that first meeting, and among the

ideas shared was the late Addie Lee Lister's of holding a special day with booths to demonstrate early homemaking skills and other crafts. Addie Lee credited the late Ed Petterson, an artistic woodworker, with creating the name Hootin an Hollarin and developing the festival's original Cedar Pete logo.

The first festival was held the last weekend in October with Springfield radio entertainer Loyd Evans serving as master of ceremonies and Rex Ebrite and J. J. Pace serving as announcers.

The schedule was filled with demonstrations by local residents making lye soap, hominy, sorghum, shingle shakes and other old-time items.

A horse-drawn hay wagon took folks on a moonlight ride to the ballpark and back, and Brixey blacksmith Henry Hubbard brought in a forge and shod six horses.

The Pontiac Area Association (now incorporated into the Theodosia Chamber of Commerce) served charcoal-grilled hamburgers and other delicious choices, and on Saturday a "basket dinner" was served on the courthouse lawn, open to everyone. The Times reported that the food for the dinner was contributed by the Lions Club and local residents. Servers listed were Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Pace, Lyndell Strong, Dorcas Rackley, Betty Rackley, Mrs. G. R. Crisp, Mrs. G. W. Rogers, Mrs. Loren Taylor, Helen Marie Luna, Frances Johnson and Lou Anna Wade.

To serve as a landmark for the event, a cabin that was someone's former smokehouse, was moved to the southwest corner of the square by "Roy Smith, who hauled it in almost intact," the Times reported. "He was aided by Mel Hambelton. Μ. L. O'Dean Kirkpatrick, Evans, John Dodson and others. Elbert Owen of Dora supplied a cornshuck mop and Mrs. G. R. Crisp a gourd dipper for atmosphere. Gordon Archie of Theodosia and Nick Salst of Ocie brought in rails for a stake-and-rider fence."

A moonshine still – or parts of one – stood next to the cabin. Several years ago, Addie Lee Lister recounted how it came to be there:

"What I really wanted was a still. I knew it couldn't actually be a working still, but I thought we could have parts of one to make a display. I asked around town if anyone knew anyone who had a still, and of course everyone insisted they'd never heard of anybody having one. But then one morning I stepped out on the front porch of our house in Gainesville, and here was all this stuff - metal parts and things. It was a still," she said.

Addie Lee hauled the parts to the square and

deposited them by the cabin. As she tried to set it up, she was watched by "the loafers," as she called the old men who sat on the courthouse lawn benches, whittling and talking.

"They were hollering that I was doing it wrong," she said. "But when I said, 'Well, come over here and show me how it goes,' they claimed they didn't know how it went together – they just knew I was doing it wrong."

The first festival featured coon-dog trials, greased-pig scrambles, a best-decorated hat contest, cake walks and contests judging turkey and cow calling, fox horn blowing, archery, horseshoes, fiddling, square dancing and other skills.

Now, 63 years later, today's Hootin an Hollarin still draws large crowds to the Gainesville square. Each year's theme and lineup change while the focus remains the same. The emphasis is still on Ozark County people and their traditions, and on having fun and commemorating the past while enjoying great bluegrass and country music and reconnecting with friends and family.




